A significant and obvious growth is their tremendous speech ability. The children's verbal expression typically increases in our program and setting. Besides socializing, the children learn to foster empathy, improve language skills, and discover the concepts of sharing and teamwork. The children grows more confident, not limiting to that, practicing these concepts through socialization our children are able to grow and build a friendship bond with mutual respects for each other.

The children also expand their drawing abilities. They usually start by drawing lines, then move on to heavy strokes which gradually morph into drawing of rainbow, characters, garden landscapes, houses, blue skies, flowers and butterflies.

With Yorkland's history, the boy's ratio has always exceeded from our fellow girls. From 11 boys to 8 girls at 2021-end, we are glad to share that, we are ending this year with 11 boys and 11 girls, a balanced group of 2022 classroom.

With our mutually balanced class, we the teachers are constantly on our toes, not only keeping an eye on the children but also to be their 'play buddies'. So, we are missing our play buddies now over this long break! And eagerly looking forward on seeing them again after the break to a brand-new year, brand new moments to cherish, to create!















As part of the Christmas festival preparations, Yorkland children made a few simple handmade ornaments, individual Beanie Hat and paper snowflakes.

Each child takes turn to hang the ornaments on our simple twig Christmas tree at the entrance. We are pretty sure that you all have stopped by, to admire the adorn Christmas tree jazzed up with cute ornaments and glowing fairy lights.



They brought home back the painted Beanie Hat first drawn out with candle wax, a fun filled activity. The children learnt a new technique when they saw the magical background appears after they painted the Beanie Hat. Then the little white dots were printed using finger tips to create snow shapes. As always, it's an amazing sight to see children using their nimble finger to create more wonders, each time.

The making of the Adorable Buttoned Sock Snowman











As the snowman description goes, this project idea started off with 3 types of socks. The first sock is the white sock which was cut out to create the Snowman's body. We then proceeded to stuff the sock with plenty of cotton. Meanwhile the other part of sock is stretched out to build the Snowman's head and neckline. Next, the little black buttons were glued, bringing out the Snowman's body coat. It's beginning to look like a sock snowman.

The second sock is happily chosen red sock for our Snowman's hat. The third sock, a soccer sock was chosen on purposely as its thicker and longer which was used to wrap around the Snowman's neck.

The last part was fun of them all! Cutting smaller pieces of orange pipe cleaner for the nose! With scissors, we trim the end of the snowman's nose to more of a point to resemble a carrot, which was then glued to the sock material.

No Christmas without cookies, we say! Along this line, we baked a batch of Christmas cookies. Starting off with whipping the egg whites and lemon juice with icing sugar until soft peaks are formed to make the Royal Icing. The children create a border around the cookie in the shape they desire, and then begin to fill the shape. While the big children use a toothpick to smooth any holes. The best cookies are the ones the children's overloads with sprinkles. Their eyes light up and they think it's the best thing ever. We always start with no expectation but the end results always look amazing, it's like; what could ever go wrong on cookies!

Like always, we had a wonderful time with Yorkland's children preparing for our Christmas festival and on the celebration day.








I'm a little star, hanging on a tree
